

Upcoming Elections

In October we will be voting on two positions: NPWCG President and VP of Programs. To legally continue as a nonprofit entity, we need members to step up and run for these positions. Each one is for a two-year term. We have allowed co-chairs before when people wanted to share the load. Here are the responsibilities to help you determine if you are willing to help out in either position:

- President run one board meeting in January, set-up an agenda, help create yearly budget and call for votes. Write monthly president's messages in the newsletter. Keeper of the Guild mailbox key and storage unit key. Facilitate other Guild decision-making as they come, usually by email like camp scholarships, unexpected expenses not covered in budget., etc. Current duties that can be passed on to other Guild members include paying Guild fees such as PO Box, Meetup account and storage unit, purchasing of non reusable supplies for Clay Camp (ex. table coverings), and setting up beginner's classes and Fair demos.
- VP of Programs coordinate the NWPCG monthly Guild meetings, namely three programs (the fourth falls on December which is the Holiday party), four round robins and four clay socials. Invite people to teach the programs and request class descriptions and materials supply lists for publication in the newsletter. In the past we have passed around a sheet asking for round robin/program teachers suggestions or finding fun things to work on in the Guild library and assigning a member to lead the program. The rest of the Board frequently helps with ideas as well. If we have a guest teacher brought in apart from Clay Camp, they would help in the administration of it, or find a volunteer that would do so.

I am willing to do either position, so both are available. The term would start in January. Current officers who will be finishing their terms will of course be available

for any questions at any time. Please consider stepping up and let's keep the Guild running smoothly!
