

# **April Round Robin**

**Program 1: Snail Trail Quilt Program**

The Snail's Trail quilt pattern looks quite complex but it is surprisingly easy to make. With endless color combinations and options, you can get very different looks using the same simple pattern. Bring your clay and see the possibilities! Here's what you'll need:

- Conditioned polymer clay in two or more colors (one block of each); make sure there is good contrast and the colors look good together
- Roller
- Cutting blade
- · Work surface.

# **Program 2: Tsunami Cane**

This round robin shows an old but good technique to making the tsunami cane. It makes a fun pattern and can also be a great background for other cane slices. We'll be following this <u>Tutorial by PC Polyzine</u>. Materials we need:

- Pasta machine
- Clay blade
- Brayer/clay rolling object
- 1 oz (half block) each, two colors for skinner blend (I usually prefer white plus another color)

- 1/8 block white
- 1/8 block silver clay for stripes.

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
