Faux ceramics, real fun!

But before I go into that... as you may have heard, we received a ton of polymer clay donations from Cheryl Simmons' wife and Kim Day brought a small portion of that last meeting. Members were free to browse and get what they needed. There will be more in the October meeting, so be sure to check Susan's announcement below.

After members gathered what they wanted from the collection and organized the rest, we gathered around for the faux ceramics program, more specifically faux raku, demonstrated by Holly Alanis. Raku is a type of Japanese pottery that involves the use of intense heat and water which produces a very interesting crackling effect.



First, Holly prepared a sheet of white polymer clay. She soft cured it using a heat gun. After curing it for a couple of minutes, she put it on top of an unbaked, conditioned layer of colored polymer clay and ran it through the pasta machine together until she achieved the crackle effect on the white layer.



November Round Robin: Cane-covered Round Ornaments

November's meeting topic will be a demonstration on how to cover round ornaments with polymer clay. I will show you a few different techniques, one will be with square cane slices. It's easy and a great way to use up leftover canes.

If you're like me, you've probably got some old, scratched-up glass Christmas tree balls hiding away somewhere. Bring them and some to share, if you have them. We'll magically transform them into beautiful one-of-a-kind artworks. Okay, it's not magic, but they are cool techniques!

I will also bring free samples of my Ornament Baking Tube (pat. pend.) for curious clayers. You're curious now, aren't you?

You will need:

- work surface
- pasta machine
- 4 to 6 ounces of your favorite colors of clay
- texture sheets and mica powders, optional
- about 3-4 inches long of any square cane, about one inch square
- blade for slicing cane slices and an exacto blade
- smallish 'roller' for smoothing (I use a knitting needle)
- isopropyl (rubbing) alcohol
- old glass Christmas tree ball
- pencil, chopstick, bamboo skewer, or skinny little stick from your yard
- masking, blue, or Scotch tape.
