## 5th Anual Gingerbread House-Making Party

As a reminder, this activity will be a **Zoom only** event this year. You may use your own candies that you make. Since part of the fun is sharing the clay candies with others, and using what they make as well, I'm attempting to provide an option, and here's the best I could come up with.

#### **Main Event Details:**

What: Gingerbread House Making Zoom-Only Party

When: Saturday, November 13th

Time: 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

#### Here's what you need to do before the Main Event:

**Candy Swap** - This takes place before the Gingerbread House-Making Party. Make approximately 1:4 scale candies for a gingerbread house, prebaked.

**Quantity -** I will evenly divide the candies I receive into piles. Each person who brought some will get some back (including a portion of the candies they donated).

When do I need to get the candies I made to you? - Mail or drop off the the candies to me by Friday November 5th at the latest. <u>Email</u> me for my address or phone number.

When do I get the candies others made? - Pick up the candies from my place (or pay for shipping) somewhere between November 6th (Saturday) and our Gingerbread House-Making Party, on November 13th (Saturday).

I can't guarantee anything since this is a post office issue, but this was the best compromise I could find between giving people enough time to make candies, and the amount of time it takes a priority mail package to be received within the US.

I will also provide pre-baked gingerbread house pieces (finished house size: two x three inches). For those that wish to make their own, the recipe I like is two parts Premo gold to one part Premo burnt umber.
