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## Recap: Covering Slimline Retractable Pen Kits with Cheryl Dixon

Cheryl did a fabulous job demonstrating her steps and tricks for covering pen blanks with polymer clay and assembling the pen kits. Here is a non-comprehensive list of some of her tips (PS: she said she'd bring her pen putter together thing – technical term obviously – to Clay Camp).

She first covered the clay with a base layer. Since she was using a translucent chrysanthemum cane as the top layer,

she showed how it looked after baking depending on the base color used. She also demonstrated what the final pen looks like using thin (4 on her pasta machine, and her preferred setting) or thick base layers. The thin one resulted in a slimline type pen, and the thick one could be good for older people that have a hard time holding on to pens. She did a bevel (slanted) cut, so she could join the ends almost seamlessly.

The blank was rolled, but not hard because you don't want to stretch the clay and make it longer than the blank. For the cane covering, she liked the chrysanthemum cane because it was very forgiving – you didn't even need to do complete slices. If you put the cane slices on your base layer before covering the blank, you could use cane slices to help cover the seam as well.

Cheryl showed us how far to press the components together, although her machine could take them apart again if it was accidentally too far. She also showed how she sands her blanks before assembly – they are put on a drill mandrel, and she just gently holds the different grits of sandpaper up to the rotating pen blank, so no sore wrists. Love it! All in all, an easy way to make classy gifts (the pen kits definitely look better than covering bics in my opinion).

She gets her kits from <u>Penn State Industries</u>, if you're interested. The jigs are more expensive, and were somewhere around \$75 I believe. Thanks for the excellent program Cheryl.




















## Feb Program: Clay Social

#### Clay Camp Swap: Totems!




This was meant to be our swap theme for both previously canceled in-person Clay Camps. Since we are a go this year, barring state or camp mandates, it is finally happening. So, here's a refresher of what the requirements are.

Totems are basically big beads that have a big hole in the middle, which can be stacked on the provided totem stand (skewer with lovely bases made by Dawn). Each dimension (length, width and height) needs to be between 1 inch and 3 inches. That means the smallest that would count as a totem is 1 inch by 1 inch by 1 inch, the largest would be 3 inch by 3 inch by 3 inch, but everything in between is also fine (example 1 inch by 1.5 inch by 3 inch). The hole should be big enough for the skewer, which is around 4-5 mm.

Totems can be just about anything. Animals, flowers, rocks, vegetables with faces, pretty colors, geometric shapes. Way back in 2017, Meredith went to the polymer clay teacher's retreat, an exclusive clay retreat for those that teach polymer clay, and she brought back a wonderful assortment of totems. Feel free to look here, or do a pinterest search for polymer clay totems for inspiration.

Here's the one part that confused people a lot the last time around. We will be making totems in sets of 5. You can join as many sets as you would like. If you want to make two sets, then you would make 10 totems, for example. Not all of the totems in a set must be the same, HOWEVER, no two sets of totems can be the same. So if you want to make two sets, here are several of the combinations you can do: A) 5 of one type, 5 of a different type.



B) 10 all different C) 5 of one type, 5 all different. What is not allowed: A) 10 all of the same type B) more than 5 of the same type. Here is a swap infographic to show how the swapping works. For each swap group of 5 you join, you will receive 5 different ones back. You will not receive one of your own back. The swap happens at clay camp, usually on Saturday.
