

May Make-Along Program



This month, I have been requested to demonstrate the steps to make a triangular Paradox cane. The clay needed for this are two skinner blends and a sheet of black. The skinner blends should go from white to another color to black. Do this twice with different colors. The finished sheets should be at the thickest setting of your pasta machine and should be about 4" square. Variations of multiple colors in the middle of the white and black would work too. The black sheet will need to be at a medium thin thickness and you will need enough to wrap two bullseye canes. You will also need a sheet of paper and pencil for notes – I found this extremely helpful to have when I needed to refer back to which color should go where when constructing the cane. The only other tools needed are a clay blade and a pasta machine.


I want to give a big thank you to Kim for the program last month which was making the cutest little cat figures. I have three of them sitting on my desk staring at me right now.







Step 1 and 2







Clay Camp 2023 Registration is Open!

All the information you could need is available on our **website**. We have around 18 confirmed campers so far, and a few more guaranteed, so it will be an excellent turn out.



I'm going to clear up a few things that have been confusing to some people. You must be an NWPCG member to sign up for the NPWCG Clay Camp. We use the Joinit.org site for all of our membership needs, click Log In at the top when

you go to register. If you don't remember your password, just do a password reset through the site using the email you signed up with.



Once you're logged in, click "Upcoming Events," then "Clay Camp." This brings you to "Eventbrite." You will purchase "tickets" for each thing you want to do. One is for Camp itself, and each class is a separate ticket. If you manage to buy class tickets without having purchased the actual event ticket (we are experiencing this bug, it wasn't supposed to

be allowed), we will contact you and help walk you through how to fix this. Unfortunately, the website does add processing fees, but they make it transparent what those costs are.



If you have any financial difficulty, we want to try and make it easier to attend camp by offering **scholarships**. This ends up being a \$50 off coupon towards the camp registration. There is a link to the scholarship form on our website. Fill it

out, send it in, and we'll give you the promo code to use when registering.



The facility has a great kitchen (with oven/stovetop, fridge and freezer, microwave, hot and cold water dispenser), a large work area, two bathrooms, an office that will double as our second classroom, and a nice sized classroom that has a closed door, but open at the top (not soundproof).

The camp activities are described on the website as well, but here's a list of some of the events.

- Snack table bring food to share (optional). Since there is a fridge, perishables like fruits are okay, but mark it clearly with a sign that people can see when opening the fridge,
- Free table bring anything extra you'd like to get rid of you think people will
 want, usually clay supplies. Anything left over from what you bring or is not
 claimed by others, you must bring back home with you,
- Raffle this will be Sunday afternoon after/during our potluck
- Swap all swap items must be turned in to Kim by Saturday morning. Swap assignments will be given out Saturday evening.
- Sell table you may bring some items (usually handmade clay pieces) to sell.
 Clearly mark your name and price on it. Any buyers must pay the seller, the Guild is not in charge of the table,
- Bottles of Hope competition one entry into the competition per person allowed, but additional decorated bottles may be donated. Bottles to cover will be available at the event,
- · Brown bag exchange extra small brown lunch sacks will be available as well,
- Sunday potluck starting around noon on Sunday, we will have a potluck lunch, and it will transition into the party with the raffle (we'll give time for people to browse, and do a last call for tickets), brown bag exchange, and Bottles of Hope winners announcements. The Guild will provide some food (Costco rotisserie chicken has been mentioned).

Review

April Cat Figures

For our April make-along, Kim Day led the group in making some easy cat figurines, based on a fondant Youtube video (<u>Cómo Hacer un Gato en Fondant, Fácil y Rápido// Easy Fondant Cat Caketopper</u>). To make things easier, we went ahead and cut out circles in a flat sheet of clay, and here are the amounts of circles/parts used in each piece of the ca:.

Torso: 5 partsLegs: 1 part each

Tail: ½ part or more if you want a bushier tail

• Head: 6 parts

• Ears: both ears together are .5 parts

Here is a non-exhaustive list of some of the sculpting tips mentioned:

- Whenever joining two pieces of clay, use a dab of liquid clay or kato poly paste
- When joining two pieces, try and maximize join area (example, cut front legs at an angle to attach)
- Use a toothpick to hold the head in place (plus liquid clay)
- Support your sculpture when baking. Can use polyester batting, marbles, balls
 of tin foil, paper (I accordion fold a lot for bead making).
- For a more realistic cat, smooth all join lines. Stroking with fingers, rolling with a ball tool or end of paintbrush or silicone tipped sculpting tool.
- To remove fingerprints, pet gently in one direction, use a Q-tip with alcohol or acetone, or give up and add texture (such as fur). Never count on sanding after baking.

Photo submission guidelines:

- When taking photos, make sure the room is well lighted. Taking pictures beside a window during the day provides nice lighting
- Keep your background clear. Use a blank sheet of paper, plain bedsheet or parchment paper – these are materials that are usually easy to find at home and make good backgrounds
- Before you click, make sure the subjects are sharp and clear. If using a phone, double clicking on the item usually focuses on it. If this does not work for you, check your phone manual.
- As much as possible, please do not crop your photos before submitting.
