July Work-along

Hello everyone! I find that I am having a hard time getting back to my clay table (and my computer to write this up!) Camp was as over the top and jam packed with creative people as it always is, with lots of old friends and lots of new ones too. Maybe this project will get me back to my clay.

We will be zooming on Sunday July 2nd, making a stained glass and wisteria picture. It could be used on a journal cover, hung on your wall or, if you use translucent clay, hung in a window so the light can show through.

Materials:

- Translucent clay (enough for a thin sheet the size of your finished piece),
- · Green clay for leaves,
- · Small amount of pale lilac,
- Small amount of a darker purple,
- Blue alcohol inks (to go on translucent clay) or
- · Blue clay for a sky background,

• Five or six variously sized logs of color wrapped in black (either colored translucent clay or opaque depending on the look you want) to make a cane for the border.

Note: If you are making the logs for the stained glass with translucent clay, I would highly recommend wrapping the log in a very thin layer of white first so that the translucent color is not muddied by the black clay.

Optional add ons:

- · Green or gold mica powder to highlight the leaves,
- Chameleon micro glitters to give some shimmer to the sky background or added color to the wisteria flowers

Tools

You will need:

- · A pasta machine,
- · Blade,
- · Exacto knife,
- · Small ball stylus,
- A set of the small circle cutters I used the 6mm, 3.5mm and 3mm diameter cutters for the leaves and flower petals (alternately, if you don't have these you can just roll out small balls of clay), and
- · A needle tool.





Photo submission guidelines:

• When taking photos, make sure the room is well lighted. Taking pictures beside a window during the day provides nice lighting

- Keep your background clear. Use a blank sheet of paper, plain bedsheet or parchment paper
 these are materials that are usually easy to find at home and make good backgrounds
- Before you click, make sure the subjects are sharp and clear. If using a phone, double clicking on the item usually focuses on it. If this does not work for you, check your phone manual.
- As much as possible, please do not crop your photos before submitting.
