Using Polymer Canes

So you have made a cane... or 20. What do you do now? When I started learning to cane I was with a Facebook group called 52 Canes and The 52 Cane Cafe. We made two canes each week from the same tutorials and shared our results via FB. It was a wonderful way to learn to cane and the canes piled up... some three years worth. I loved making them but had very little idea of what to actually do with them. That was not my focus at the time.

This month I will discuss ways to creatively use your canes, storage and organization of canes. I will also do a quick demo using old, crumbly canes to make a veneer. If you want to work along to make a veneer, you will need:

- basic tools,
- translucent clay,
- a tile to work and bake on, and
- a few canes (they don't need to be your old ones).







Photo submission guidelines:

- When taking photos, make sure the room is well lighted. Taking pictures beside a window during the day provides nice lighting
- Keep your background clear. Use a blank sheet of paper, plain bedsheet or parchment paper these are materials that are usually easy to find at home and make good backgrounds

- Before you click, make sure the subjects are sharp and clear. If using a phone, double clicking on the item usually focuses on it. If this does not work for you, check your phone manual.
- As much as possible, please do not crop your photos before submitting.
