



For those on social media, you may have seen that some of us are doing something called the 21 Day Project. It's from the 100 Day Project group and follows the same rules. In general, pick an art-related subject, do something each day, and you can post it on their Facebook group. If you miss a day you can choose to skip it or just count the days you do your art (21 day project can take months if you choose).

It's such a flexible challenge, where you can choose a task that takes five minutes, or work daily on parts of a bigger project. I encourage anyone that has not been creating for a bit to give themselves a challenge. Maybe a seven day challenge? Maybe a once a week challenge?

Sometimes you just won't feel creative or inspired, and that can be the time where you most need art in your life. Developing ways to encourage yourself can lead to cool things happening, or by making creating more of a habit so that you don't need to seek the perfect confluence of events to make it happen.

My clay room is mostly empty, but it's ready for me to start moving some things back in. I might wait for all the painting to be done so I don't have to inhale all the fumes. I hope to set up a place where I can record reels, this has been on my to do list for years! It's very exciting to see things coming together.



I tried out a newish product that has been recommended by other clayers – **Kamenskaya liquid gilding**. It comes in a little bottle with a nail polish brush in the lid. It dries quickly since it's in alcohol based, and theoretically doesn't need to be sealed. The colors are nice and metallic, and many people are using them to do edges on polymer clay earrings, or lines in pumpkins. You can find it on Amazon or their website, just don't buy metallic alcohol inks by accident. Until I

plug my oven in, I've only used it on unbaked clay, so I can't attest to its durability yet. So far, it's very pretty. You can see it on the blue textured earring pieces in my Show and Tell.

I would also like to encourage people to message a Board member (Kim, Maria, or Dawn) if they have ideas they think would make good programs (reels, YouTube, other), or if they

are willing to teach next year. We are happy to help come up with topics or even assign you a technique if you are willing to teach but need ideas.
