

Gallardia Canes with Dawn Gray


Start with:

Sheets of white, black, translucent, and dark red/burgundy. The amount and thickness will depend on how big you want your cane.

Skinner Blend block going from yellow to dark red

- Step 2: Roll that slice into a snake, keeping colors together
- Step 3: Roll dark red sheet to your thinnest setting and wrap around the snake
- Step 4: Reduce snake to about 1/8" thick, cut into 1" lengths.

Step 5: Cut triangles off of the skinner blend.




Step 6: Put triangle together so that the colors match and make another snake. Wrap in either red or black. Repeat steps 3 and 4.

Step 7: Put all the 1" lengths together with the yellow in the center and red on the outer edge. Reduce to $\frac{1}{2}$ " thickness.

Flower Petals


Step 1: Put black and white sheets together and reduce them to your second thinnest setting. I use the #5 on my Atlas.

Step 2: Cut the petal into 4 pieces. Add sheets of the dark red (thinnest setting you can work with) to the petals. Put the sliced petals back together.




Step 3: Wrap the petal with the black/white sheet, keeping the white on the outside where it will be next to the translucent packing.

Step 4: Indent the top edge (yellow) with a blunt edged tool and pack with translucent to keep the shape.



Step 5: Reduce the cane to 6" long. Cut into 3 pieces and put together.



Step 6: Reduce the cane to 8" long.

Step 7: Cut into 4 pieces and assemble around the center.

Step 8: Reduce to the size you want.





December 1st: winter Party

As usual, our December program is our annual Winter celebration. This info will also be in the December newsletter, but the more warning we get to make plans, the better. We will be meeting on Zoom at our usual meeting time of noon.

We will have the following events:

- drawing for gift certificates for participating in Show and Tell at our meetings or in the newsletter throughout the year,
- · brown bag gift exchange, and
- the non-raffle raffle of donated prizes.
- We will also likely have a few gift cards as door prizes to be awarded by random draw among attendees.

Brown Bag Gift Exchange

Usually, the brown bag gift exchange involves clay related items. Bring a gift that you think others would enjoy receiving. Please make sure there are no white elephant type gifts. Although this is not a firm rule, shoot for around \$25 value. Some ideas include something you made (past gifts included clay jewelry, clay sculptures, scarves and clay ornaments), clay related supplies (past gifts included stamps, cutters, jewelry findings, organization boxes, and Kato blackout), and things like gift cards, chocolates and even cookie dough. The gifts each year all end up being lovely.

Here are the rules for the Zoom brown bag exchange: each participant will be randomly assigned a number that determines the order we go. Except for the very first person, each other person can steal an already opened gift (gifts can be stolen once, and then are no longer available to steal), or choose a randomized unopened gift to open. If you see something you like, please steal. It's fun, and guarantees that the gift goes to someone who will treasure it. At the end, the first person has the option to exchange the gift they opened for any unstolen gift.

Since this is on Zoom, each person will need to mail their gift to the recipient. If this would be a financial hardship, please let me know and the Guild will cover the shipping cost. I will keep track of the names and addresses where the gift needs to go. Connect to people by email so we can exchange names and addresses.

Non-raffle Raffle

Anybody can donate items to the raffle. Proceeds go to the Guild's general fund. To donate an item, either get it to me on or before the December 1st party. Email me a picture of the item you are donating or have it on your person during the party and be ready to show it when prompted.

Each item will have a number, and you will message me (on Zoom or by text) how many \$1 tickets you would like to purchase, along with the amount of tickets for each item. Example: "I want 4 tickets, and I want 3 tickets in item 3, and 1 ticket in item 4,"
